HIDDEN TREASURES

We have recently put most of the Cook Family Archives on CD and found several real treasures in the process including Book 5 of the Henry Howland Cook mission journal. This covers his mission experience from June, 1897 in New Zealand to July 1902 following his return home. It is a fascinating narrative of life at the turn of the last century and his commitment to his religion. I would love to have the first four journals to add to the family collection. Does anyone know where they are?

The original archives were maintained for many years by Mabel Cook Rex. After her death, Lawana Osborne obtained and kept the records, which contain over 1000 pages of documents including: 1) several hundred family group sheets including a PAF file of the 61 verified group sheets: 2) several histories: 3) a manuscript used to prepare the second printing of the P. W. Cook diary; 4) administrative items such as meeting minutes, 5) family member pedigree charts; 6) photographs; 7) a complete set of the 37 P. W. Cook newsletters dating back to 1970; 8) MP3 recordings of several family activities including a 1976 interview with Idalia Cook Covey Madsen (the youngest and only child of Phineas and Johanna still living in 1976) and her daughter, Eva Covey Madsen; and 9) the 1969 and 2002 descending pedigree charts.

Histories include those of William Knowles, P. W. Cook, David Savage,

Amanda Savage, John Savage, Hyrum Johnston McCann, Mary R Cook McCann, and Rosella McCann Erickson.

We invite each of you to review any historical or genealogical documents you may wish to contribute to the archive. You can add documents to the archive in two ways: 1) send a copy to Brent W Hale at 4319 West 87th Street, Tulsa, OK 74132; or 2) arrange for us to copy your documents with a digital camera. This can be done in your home and by request to Brent Hale (918-445-2161).

New material will be added to CDs as received. The material currently on file is a two CD set available to any interested family members. See our Family Store in this newsletter to order a copy.

I recommend that you get a copy of the CD Archive which will be two or three CD of information by time you get this newsletter.

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PRIVATE EYE WORK

As I was recently studying the 1969 version of the descending pedigree chart of Phineas Wolcott Cook, I ran across my second cousin's name who I haven't seen for thirty-four years. I wondered what and how he was doing and decided to look in the high school alumni directory for his name. Sure enough, there he was with an Arizona address, but without his home number. An internet a search of "phone books" listed 5 choices.

Hmm...what now? I looked up his sister in the San Diego phone book after finding her married name in the alumni directory and since the two sources matched, I called her and got his current phone number. He had actually moved back to Utah. What a great conversation we had on the phone and to renew our acquaintance.

This is an example of investigative work, which can be done to find out information about our ancestors and link ourselves to them and them to us. We have several "investigations" that need more manpower to finish. We need your help! Many things can now be searched using the Internet. Others need searching in books and films in research libraries, or government sources.

To get started, find 'Cookfamily. org' on the Internet and click on *volunteer*. Click one of the three choices, find a name to search and then email Janet Porter (*janetsp@hotmail.com*) or me (*mcstar@mstar2.net*) that you are going with that project. Also, if you are doing investigative study on any of the Cook line, it would be great to know to avoid duplicating your efforts. We can post your project and solicit others to help with your name if you so desire.

COOK FAMILY VOLUNTEER RESEARCH PROJECT RE-PORT

Before the year 2000 we knew almost nothing about the Phineas and Irene Cook family. Their children were born in Goshen, Connecticut where in 1810 the oldest child Betsy died at age two and one-half. The family lost their farm and home and moved to Richland Michigan when Phineas was about eighteen. In Richland, Phineas married, joined the L.D.S. Church, and emigrated. His parents are buried there in the Prairie Home Cemetery.

As a result of the Volunteer Research Project we now know considerably more about the family. The oldest son was Daniel, born 20 Nov. 1808. He married Helen King in 1830 in Goshen where two children were born. In the 1850 census their names were listed as Mary and Maria, 18 and 16 years old. Maria didn=t live out the year because on July 28 she was buried. At that time the family lived in Hastings, Barry County, Michigan. Helen was listed as AElin;@ both she and Daniel were 41 years old.

Subsequent census records show the family made their permanent home in Hastings, a few miles north of Richland. In 1860 Daniel was a Justice of the Peace and in 1870 operated his own saw mill. By then his real estate was valued at \$7,000 and personal estate at \$1,000. On Nov. 20, 1867 when he was 59 years old, Daniel signed his last will and testament. He lived another eleven years because on March 26, 1877 his probate hearing was held.

Apparently Helen died before Daniel. Death records are hard to find in Pioneer times, but Louisa Jane Burrows was listed in the 1870 census as his adopted daughter, 20 years old, and the only other person in the household. Louisa was also named executrix. She was to receive all his goods if she cared for Daniel to the end of his life.

Eliza was born 7 Jul 1811. She and her husband Salmon Hall joined the church before Phineas and Ann Eliza. She emigrated without Salmon and died 19 Dec. 1889 in Garden City, Rich, Utah. Their interesting story will be the subject of an article another time.

Darius Burgess, b. about 1814, was the forth child of Phineas and Irene. As a teen he worked for the Litchfield Inquirer, cultivating a lifetime interest in the printing and newspaper business. In 1837 he spent a year in Washington D.C. working for the National Intelligencer, sharpening his skills by writing and spending time in the

Senate gallery listening to the great statesmen of his day. After making two trips to Michigan, he brought home a wife and took a job in Kalamazoo at a printing office. In 1842 he bought the Niles Republican Newspaper and hauled a hand-press from Kalamazoo to Niles on an ox cart. There he made his home where he and his wife Jane Wadhams had three and possibly four children, three sons and a daughter. Three of the children are named in the census; a fourth was named in his obituary.

Jane died at age 71 in 1889 in Niles. Darius lived another twelve years and died May 24, 1901, one of the most respected citizens of the town.

Mary Ann, born 15 July 1816, was 22 years old when she moved with the family to Michigan. For three years she wondered if there might be a single man in frontier Michigan who would notice her. Then her brother Phineas Wolcott went to work for Phillip Leonard in Yankee Springs, just north of Richland in Barry County. Phineas put a roof on Phillip=s house

and told him about his sister Mary Ann back in Richland. Promising to introduce Phillip to his sister, Phineas went home to find Phillip had introduced himself. In three weeks, on August 25, 1841, Mary Ann was married.

In the 1850 census Phillip and Mary Ann had three children: Melina, 5, George, 3 and Harriet, 1. They still lived in Yankee Springs and Phillip was a prosperous inn keeper. Mary Ann=s comfortable future seemed assured. However, she apparently became ill shortly afterward and had to go home to be cared for by her mother. She died in Richland and was buried there beside her father in the Prairie Home Cemetery on May 3, 1854, leaving three small children.

Phineas Wolcott, born 28 Aug. 1819, was the sixth child and youngest son in the family.

Harriet, born 11 May 1823, was the youngest child. We know only she married Gaius Fuller and died in 1906. Further research needs to be done on this family.

Thanks to Shirl Cook for never giving up on this project. He=s as busy as the rest of us, but continues from his home in Arizona, ordering census and other records and finding little bits of information which fit into the big picture. Little by little the family portrait is coming together.

Dean S Cook is one of the youngest great-grandsons of Phineas Wolcott Cook. He has been active in the organization for many years. One time in a meeting with Elder Sterling W Sill, he learned from him a law of success.

You go by your [five] fingers. These [four] are The first the workers. one is "know your business". The second is "be converted". You have to be converted to be successful in what ever you are doing. The third is "desire". It is this great big finger (in the mid-

dle). The fourth is "love the work". Love it. Love your work. If you have those four big fingers, you are all right. The fifth [and smaller finger] is "just do it" and you will be suc-It applies to any encessful. deavor.

When asked what would be the most important work of the family organization right now, Dean responded: "I think as far as the greater family organization, the

most important thing they could do would be to just correlate some things. They can identify the work of the smaller family organizations and can accomplish some history research and have success on that line. I think it would be wise for the family organization to send out newsletters periodically regardless of whether people are members of the organization or not."
